Concordia Lutheran Church is coming to an awareness of our being located at a confluence of various migratory pathways!

This is the basic idea behind a grant proposal we forwarded on to the Lily Foundation this past spring. Our proposal would gift me a Sabbatical to explore regions where bird migration and human immigration overlap, areas like the border region of Southeast Arizona, the Bering Strait of Alaska, and New York City. It would also provide funding for Concordia to determine who our nearest creaturely neighbors are and improve our grounds to be more hospitable to these neighbors, the bees, birds, and butterflies that use or live on our campus. It would also help us think about how we might be a presence for rest and respite for the hikers who often sojourn through our churchyard on the Superior Hiking Trail.

We were awarded the grant!!!

Beginning the last Sunday in April, the project will begin in earnest as I embark on a Sabbatical in search of birds, rest, and renewal. The congregation will host speakers and hold events that help us to imagine our place at the crossroads of migration. Trees and flowers and grasses will be planted. Bird and bat houses will be made. Community will be nurtured as Concordia comes together in activity and learning.

Prior to the window of this renewal project, we will seek to explore the concepts of migration and immigration to get prepared for this adventure. Our Sunday School will do so through Bible story and activity (Hawk Ridge on October 8th!). We hope to schedule Social Justice potluck speakers. We are looking forward to Lent being a time to center ourselves around this theme.

As the project timeframe nears, we will have more details to share about how it all works. For now, I wanted to share with you this exciting news. I look forward to the renewal we will experience!

Worship Matters: Harvest Season

Autumn is the season for bringing in the harvest, and outside our doors, there are signs of changes to come. We are surrounded by the colors of autumn's rich palette as trees begin to release their leaves to nourish the next generation of trees and plants release their seeds to replenish the earth. There are also signs of change as we continue our journey through Ordinary Time. As we move closer to the end of the Church Year, we look more closely at our response to the word. Two questions seem to circle around the lectionary in these days of autumn: How do we live in community and what are the values that create community? Jesus' teachings guide us, showing us how forgiveness, repentance, justice, and peace are central to the harvest's abundance.

We begin the month in the vineyard – a metaphor for God's kingdom and a place of God's grace. We will hear parables that describe and explore the meaning of what life is like in God's kingdom on October 8 and 15. On October 22, we hear a timely question about what belongs to God. As the month concludes, Jesus summarizes the commandments with what has been the core of his life and teaching: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul, and with all your mind and . . . You shall love your neighbor as yourself."

October includes many commemorations (listed on pages 15-17 of Evangelical Lutheran Worship). When a commemoration falls on Sunday, an intercession is included in the prayer of the church. On October 15, we will remember Teresa of Avila, teacher and renewer of the church. Here are two excerpts from her devotional writings:

Christ has no body but yours, No hands, no feet on earth but yours, yours are the eyes with which he looks Compassion on this world, Yours are the feet with which he walks to do good, Yours are the hands, with which he blesses all the world.

Lord, grant that I may always allow myself to be guided by you, always follow your plans, and perfectly accomplish your holy will. Grant that in all things, great and small, Today and all the days of my life, I may do whatever you may require of me. Help me to respond to the slightest prompting of your grace, so that I may be your trustworthy instrument, for your honor. May your will be done in time and eternity – by me, in me, and through me. Amen.

If you hear that someone is sick or hospitalized, do not tell others unless you have been given permission by them to do so. If you wish to be visited by the Pastor or placed on the prayer list, contact the Church office. If you have a conversation with someone who is ill. hospitalized, or have come to be in a short or long term care facility, ask them if they want the congregation and Pastor to know what is happening before you pass the word along. Do not assume that because you know, that the individual wants everyone else to, as well. Honoring the privacy of our neighbors, as well as expressing our own desire for the church or pastor to know of our condition, helps to prevent troublesome situations and helps us support one another!

Big, community-building events are so important to us because our mission is, in part, building a more just and compassionate community. That is why we host so many events to nurture this reality!

This fall, on **October 17th**, we are hosting our Golden Gala, in commemoration of our 50th Anniversary. We are hosting the Gala to bring Chum's mission and our stories to more people than ever before. There will be a gourmet dinner, silent and live auctions, inspiring stories, and awards.

We are also making this a bigger event because we need more support. Over the last few years, we have seen a decrease in contributions, which has led to heavy reliance on grants and other sources of funding.

We hope that with your help we will be able to raise money for our general operating budget. Our goal this year is to raise \$250,000 at the Golden Gala.

How can you help? Attending is one great way. Another would be to host your own table. Table hosts gather like-minded community members to attend the event with them. FAST SERVICE!!

We have never seen the demand we are seeing now: It used to take us up to 2 hours to get rid of 72 boxes of food at the Downtown Food Shelf—now we are doing it in as little as 45 minutes! And it is even busier and quicker out west, and at our pop-up locations!

We usually see an increase in need during the summer months due to kids being out of school, and while in years past we have tried to build a stockpile of food to keep us moving forward, it has proven most difficult to do that this year.

Five high-impact actions You can take to help the environment.

Fix your water leaks The average home leaks more than 10,000 gallons of clean water each year through leaky pipes, toilets, showerheads and other fixtures. That's equal to the water needed to wash 270 loads of laundry. Toilets are especially leak-prone (20% of all toilets leak), but because they are often silent, these leaks can go unnoticed. Learn more on how to fix leaks and save water: Is your toilet taking a leak?

Buy less stuff: Consumer goods that are cheaper to throw away than to repair have become common. And the amount of goods that we purchase, use, and then throw away has risen over time. This affects the environment in lots of negative ways. Here are some questions to ask yourself before heading to the store or the internet to shop: **1**. Do I truly need this (new phone or gadget, clothing item, other consumer product) or can I get by without it? **2**. Can I borrow, rent, or trade for this item? **3**. If I really need to buy it, can I get it second-hand? **4**. If I do buy new, is there a product with a Lifetime Warranty?

Slay your energy vampires: Do you leave your phone or laptop chargers, DVD player, video game console, or other electronic devices plugged in when you're not using them? If so, you likely have energy vampires lurking in your home. Energy vampires are big energy wasters! They can account for 10% or more of a home's electric use, which makes them expensive to own. Energy vampires are electrical items that continue to use electricity even when turned off — things that draw power when in standby mode and/or have a display light. Slay these vampires by unplugging them when not in use. Installing advanced power strips can also help.

Be an eco-driver: Sometimes it's not what we drive but how we drive that determines how much carbon and other emissions our vehicles generate. In 2016, consider using these eco-driving habits when you're behind the wheel. **1.** Speed up and slow down smoothly. **2.** Drive the speed limit. (The EPA estimates a 10-15% improvement in gas mileage by driving 55 mph instead of 65 mph) **3.** Keeping tires properly inflated. **4.** Maintain a steady speed. **5.** Avoid excess idling.

Water a tree: Did you know that trees help us to save water and energy? Trees keep us cooler during the summer, improve water quality, and reduce air pollutants, among many other benefits. If you have trees in your landscape or on your boulevard, one of the best things you can do is to water them. Newly planted trees especially need watering for the first 3-5 years after planting. Mature trees need extra water during periods of drought.

Greetings on behalf of the Northeastern Minnesota Synod's Welcome and Reconciling Team!

Since the formation of our team some six years ago, we have been engaged in helping congregations discern their welcome of LGBTQIA+ members and neighbors. We have walked alongside congregations as they explored their openness to calling rostered leaders from the LGBTQIA+ community. Now, we are excited to be embarking on a new endeavor to help our synod discern whether we should become a Reconciling in Christ Synod!

Becoming a Reconciling in Christ Synod entails extending a public welcome to and affirmation of people of all sexual orientations, gender identities and expressions, as well as a commitment to anti-racism in the policies, practices, and advocacy of our synod. In order to discover if the Northeastern Minnesota Synod is ready to make these commitments, our team will hold a quarterly gatherings in each of the five conferences of our synod. These gatherings will include discussion, education, and resourcing around a topic. Our first forums will explore what welcome means. The second forums will address how we read scripture as Lutherans and what that means for our welcome of LGBTOIA+ people. The third session will help those gathered to understand the various terms used by those in the LGBTOIA+ community to describe their orientation, identity, and expression. The fourth will center the experiences of those in the LGBTQIA+ community as we listen to their stories of faith. The fifth gathering will hone in on the importance of intersectionality and how working for justice for LGBTOIA+ people is intertwined with that for all marginalized people. The sixth and final quarterly session will help us explore how we as synod, congregation, and individuals can be advocates and allies.

At the conclusion of these gatherings, the Welcome and Reconciling Team will prayerfully consider whether our Synod is ready and willing to make these public commitments. If so, a memorial voicing these commitments will come before the Synod Assembly in 2025. If the memorial passes, we will be an RIC Synod and will be accountable for following through on the commitments we made!

It is our hope that members of our synod will make it a priority to participate in these gatherings to better aid our discernment process. As of now, the dates and places of most of our first quarter sessions have been settled!
