Sorry to start controversial conversations at Christmastime, but which do you prefer: Artificial or Real Christmas Tree?

I have to say, I grew up with the real thing. I can still smell that evergreen scent and remember chasing the dog away from drinking the sap-water beneath the tree. It was always a little magical going out to pick one off of a lot or to cut down our own. As I have gotten older, however, I have changed allegiances to the artificial. It is easier to deal with when the celebration is over! There are no needles to sweep up! It is always the same height!

I am sure, at one time, I thought only the real thing would suffice, but time and experience and, dare I admit, convenience, have altered that opinion. Christmas, I have come to believe, doesn't just have to be one thing anymore. It doesn't have to be the same thing anymore. And what is "real" anyway? Cannot a representation of a tree facilitate the same festivity and cheer that one grown from the ground could?

The Incarnation of God as Jesus Christ, which we celebrate at Christmas, has a way of dismantling all of our ideas that there is only one way or a right way to observe the holy day. It challenges our beliefs about what is real and not. It calls into question all of our rigidities and certainties. God is at loose and alive in the world! God is with us, not just in a certain way, but in every way! What this means to me is that however, whenever we celebrate is "right and salutary," is fitting.

I do not know the particularities of your celebration this year, but I hope that wherever this holy day finds you, whoever you find yourself with, whenever you gather, that you will not judge it as "real" or "artificial," that you will not let nostalgia get in the way of honoring the sanctity of this particular moment and circumstances where God most assuredly enters the world as the babe in Bethlehem for you and for all.

Worship Matters: New Year, New Season

Advent

The "church year" or "liturgical year" is a cycle of festivals and seasons developed over centuries that we share with Christians around the world. On November 23 we concluded the year with the festival of Christ the King, and on November 30 (First Sunday of Advent) we began a new year. This annual passage of the liturgical year – the texts, changing colors, songs, symbols – is one of the ways that we learn, remember, and celebrate our faith. Christians of many traditions have found that it adds a meaningful dimension to the passing of time and their faith journey.

Advent (from the Latin *adventus*, meaning coming) is the first season of the Church Year and includes the four Sundays before Christmas. The scripture readings, prayers, and songs in this season prepare us spiritually for Christmas (the Lord's first coming at Bethlehem) and also for his eventual second coming, while we give thanks for his present and continual coming to us through Word and Sacrament.

The minor strains of our hymns, the simple chants, the absence of decorative items in our worship space, the blue paraments, the lighting of the Advent wreath, all are part of keeping this brief season. It is a time to pause and reflect, to wonder and hope, and to savor the beauty of God's plan of salvation.

The readings in this season stir up a new vision of a world in which God comes among us with themes of peace, social justice, hope, longing, judgment, and promise. For at least the four weeks of Advent, the church sets this hopeful vision and divine promise next to stories of war and conflict and the muffled cries of the poor and powerless in our world and community. The Advent journey is one of many opportunities to reaffirm that God's activity on this earth through Christ is not finished. The world is not as just, not as loving, not as whole as we know it can and should be, but the coming of Christ and his presence among us gives us reason to live in hope. During these December days, we have an opportunity to contemplate this vision as we hear the prophets' call to act with God's own justice, and as we prepare for what God has given to the world in Jesus Christ.

This is Advent. The coming is promised, but it is not yet here; so we wait and hope . . . together . . . for peace and healing to a world waiting to be reborn.

Maranatha! Come, Lord Jesus!

Thank you to Bridges to Christ for their continued knitting, crocheting, and fund raising to help provide warm wear in abundance! And to all who are involved in Love Laundry, another amazing cause.

St Francis Apartment Meals: On October 22, residents at the St. Francis Apartments in Duluth's downtown area enjoyed the third meal provided & prepared by so many of you, through the generosity of our Endowment Fund. The meal consisted of roast ham, baked beans, cheesy carrots, and a choice of apple crisp and rhubarb crisp -- or both for dessert! Apples were provided by the Bohn family, and the apple peeling, crisp preparation, and baking was a fun activity for our Sunday School families. And because of these much appreciated donations and good sale prices, we were able to feed 40 residents for a total cost of \$135.30! Which means that we can certainly schedule at least 2 more meals, our first for some time in January. We plan to serve meatloaf. More news to come!

Fabric for Mexico: To date, we have sent 11 boxes of fabric and sewing supplies to our neighbors in the Copper Canyon region of Mexico. These amazing families live in the rugged mountain areas where they farm in the fertile valleys, growing corn, potatoes, goats & chickens. When we were there, we woke most mornings to the beautiful sunrise over the mountains, the crowing of roosters, and the giggles of the children as they chased their goats down the side of the mountains to better grazing spots. They live simply -- being light, not burdened by so many things. Sewn and woven items are often sold at market or traded for what they need. Again, thank you to the Endowment Committee for supporting this project, and to all of you who have donated. At least 3 of the 11 boxes were made of donations from your sewing boxes and fabric supplies. There are so many ways to be involved in helping our siblings who need us. Thank you for all that you do & please, let us know if you have questions or concerns.



The Global Tipping Points Report 2025: The Risks They Pose and Opportunities to Act, Laura Raedeke, EcoFaith Network NE MN Team, Lutheran Church of the Cross, Nisswa, MN, NEMN Synod

- 1. With contributions from 160 authors, 23 countries, and 87 institutions, The Global Tipping Points Report 2025 (first issued in 2023) finds that already at **1.4 degrees C of global warming**, a tipping point is being crossed that reduces Earth's ability to cope with human interference, further amplifying the negative impacts of climate change (diebacks of coral reefs, rainforests, polar ice sheets, etc.). As we approach overshooting the 1.5 degree C threshold of irreversible negative tipping points, the report issues **positive tipping point strategies** to minimize the magnitude and duration of global temperature overshoot: **1)** Greenhouse Gas (GHG) emissions need to be halved by 2030 (compared with 2010 levels); **2)** we need to reach net zero GHG by 2050; **3)** and then net GHG removal from the atmosphere. **What is required:** policy mandates coordinated with finance and investment to phase in cheaper and cleaner technologies (energy, transportation, heating systems) and transition away from fossil fuels. **Positive tipping points** will not only help Earth's climate, they can simultaneously combat poverty, hunger, and inequality (more details in this month's Green Tips).
- 2. Already at 1.4 degrees C of global warming, warm water coral reefs are crossing their thermal tipping point, exhibiting unprecedented diebacks. Coral reefs are only 0.2 % of the oceans, but sustain 1/4 of all marine life, and their permanent loss, should we reach 1.5 degrees C of warming, will affect hundreds of millions of people. Their resilience can be increased by eliminating overfishing and nutrient loading from industry and agriculture (requiring local and community input), but policy mandates to phase in clean technologies and transition away from fossil fueled ones can help eliminate the 75% of Greenhouse Gases (GHG) linked to our energy systems driving climate change. These positive tipping points can reduce energy prices worldwide, accelerate access to cheaper electricity, and benefit economies of countries that currently rely on fossil fuels.
- 3. Within a few years, we are at risk of overshooting the 1.5 degree C tipping point that will commit melting polar ice sheets to irreversible sea level rise, as well as creating widespread diebacks, together with deforestation, in the Amazon rainforest (the "Earth's lungs"). The damages to the biodiversity that sustain our planet will affect hundreds of millions of people, requiring local and community action to stop deforestation and the degradation of forests, while supporting policy mandates coordinated with finance and investments to scale up sustainable and equitable carbon removal from the atmosphere. Collective action from civil society will help trigger the positive tipping points to give our policymakers a mandate to act in ways that 1) establish marine protected areas; 2) protect Indigenous rights; 3) support community-led conservation initiatives; and 4) ensure a fair and transparent valuing of nature and limit overshoot of 1.5 degrees C warming.
- 4. The Atlantic Meridonal Overturning Circulation (AMOC), the powerful ocean current that brings warm water north from warm southern oceans, then returns with colder, fresher water is steadily weakening from the melting of polar ice caps. At risk of collapse **below 2 degrees C warming**, the failure of AMOC would undermine global food and water security, plunging NW Europe into severe winters. Since 2023 there has been a radical acceleration of clean technologies worldwide (despite recent backsliding by certain nations and sectors) that can offset global warming greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions.
- 5. We humans use two out of every five arable acres for our own food production (industrial-sized row crops, livestock production), which generates 25% of greenhouse gas emissions (GHG) that are pushing Earth past its limits for supporting the life that lives on the planet. Policy and market structures currently incentivize harmful practices, but nature regeneration initiatives and more sustainable patterns of consumption and production in food and fiber supply chains can be the positive tipping points that enable civil society and governance to catalyze each other to establish clear policy signals and enforcement of standards for sustainable commodity production (soy, beef, cocoa, cotton, palm oil, etc.). Such actions can restore nature and biodiversity, simultaneously combating poverty, hunger, and inequality while building resilience to extreme weather events.
