Worship Matters: The Great Fifty Days Celebrating Easter!

Easter is not a one day event, but a fifty day celebration, known as the Great Fifty Days. The hope and promise of the Easter message, the central belief of Christianity, is observed for a week of weeks (7 x 7). The season begins with the Easter Vigil (after sundown on Holy Saturday) and includes the events of Christ's Resurrection (Easter morning), Ascension on the 40th day (May 29), and the coming of the Holy Spirit on the Day of Pentecost, the 50th day (June 8). This is the principal and oldest festival of the Church Year (first mentioned by name in 130 AD).

The early Church called this time *mystagogia*, and those baptized or affirming their baptismal vows at the Easter Vigil reflected on the meaning of their baptism and the 'mysteries' of faith. Today the whole church enters into this period of reflection and what it means to live a life of faith. It is a season for discovering and claiming our identity in the Risen Lord and preparing for our ministry as the Body of Christ.

The color for the season is white, and the symbols associated with the season are beautiful and bright. Altar flowers, absent throughout Lent, now bring the vivid colors of spring into our Sanctuary. Our worship invites us to rejoice and to go forth – to share the joy – as we offer praise and thanksgiving to God who makes all things new. Our Greeting is the Easter greeting used by Christians for centuries: Alleluia! Christ is risen! Response: Christ is risen indeed! Alleluia! The Paschal Candle (lit at the Easter Vigil from the new fire) stands near the altar. A symbol of the resurrection, the darkness of death giving way to light and life, this candle is lit for every liturgy in this season. After the Day of the Pentecost, it returns to its place by the font, a reminder that in baptism we are crucified and resurrected with Christ.

The Lectionary also takes a turn during Easter. The Sundays of Easter are unique in that all three of the readings come from the New Testament. The First Reading comes from Acts of the Apostles (stories of the early church). Our Second Reading in this lectionary cycle (Year C) is from the Book of Revelation, and our Gospel readings are mostly from John. Except for the Psalms (the "hymnal" of our Bible), we close the Old Testament during these 50 days. Our Eastertide readings offer a glimpse of the glory and power of God's love; and on the Seventh Sunday of Easter, we are brought full circle. We read the verses that close the Book of Revelation and the entire Bible; and in John we have a prayer for unity of mission, proclaiming God's love for all. We see a God who is truly the "Alpha and Omega, the first and last, the beginning and the end." And the ascended Christ promises to come again . . . "Amen. Come Lord Jesus!" (Rev. 22:20)





Protecting privacy is also a way we care for our friends who may or may not wish for others to know of their illness or condition. If you hear that someone is sick or hospitalized, do not tell others unless you have been given permission by them to do so. If you wish to be visited by the Pastor or placed on the prayer list, contact the Church office. If you have a conversation with someone who is ill. hospitalized, or has come to be in a short or long term care facility, ask them if they want the congregation and Pastor to know what is happening before you pass the word along. Do not assume that because you know, that the individual wants everyone else to, as well. Honoring the privacy of our neighbors, as well as expressing our own desire for the church or pastor to know of our condition, helps to prevent troublesome situations and helps us support one another!

The **FoodShare** Minnesota March Campaign wrapped up on April 6, and by all accounts it was a success. We met or surpassed our goals-collecting 56,353 pounds of nonperishable food \$76,718.29, not including a match to come from MN FoodShare later this month. And it's all because of you!

The need is great: Last year, the Food Shelf distributed 436,442 pounds of food to 9,744 (unduplicated) people in Duluth, and visits to the Food Shelf have been continuing to increase this year-our Food Shelf is a major source of nutrition for many individuals and families. Chum Director of Distributive Services April LeDoux explains, "We see growing numbers of individuals and families coming to the Food Shelf. They're running out of food. They're struggling to feed their children."

The gifts we received came individuals and groups, congregations and businesses, students and older adults. The involvement by youth was particularly heartening-groups of students worked together on their own, each netting hundreds of pounds of food-children at Stella Maris Academy (see photo, above) collected 2,000 pounds of food during the drive!

Focus on Cans of Soup: When in doubt, bring cans of soup to fill the CHUM donation box in the Narthex. Please remember that they should be Non-Cream soups, and preferably in pop-top cans for homeless neighbors without can openers. Soups and/or Stews or other meals in a can are always an urgent need.

And as we discussed a few Sundays ago, your dollars contributed to CHUM go much farther than your dollars at the grocery store. So write a check to CHUM, mail it to the CHUM Office, 102 W 2nd St, Duluth, MN 55802, or give your check or cash to Dave or me and we will hand deliver it to the office for you.

The need is great, and we are so blessed.

St. Francis House: Here are some highlights:

- We have two new residents moving in from the Chum shelter, and we couldn't be happier. St. Francis Apartments is for seniors who have had long experiences of homelessness, and it has become home to 32 people in this special community.
- Volunteer groups hosting events or other activities continue to be immensely appreciated by tenants and staff. This is a great way to help build our community and provide a meal for our tenants. If you would like to host a game night or a meal or some other activity at Saint Francis Apartments, contact us by email. This is a great way to get together with friends or other groups and provide a wonderful service for Chum.
- The tenants love putting on their own events, too! They prepared an Easter dinner for themselves with hams from the Chum Food Shelf, and dved Easter eggs to make things even more festive.
- Spring is around the corner! We're looking for donations of flowers for our flower boxes and garden beds. We have full sun and shade flower boxes off our lobby windows, and our front gardens would be perfect for some bushes! If you have any questions or want to donate, please email us.
- We are also decorating for spring, so if you have anything that you would like to donate, again, please feel free to reach out through email.


